SUPPORT THE VILLAGE OF N'DROUDÉ IN ITS FIGHT AGAINST POACHING

The green turtle (Chelonia mydas) is one of seven species of sea turtles in the world that is critically endangered. Although fully protected on an international level as well as listed in CITES (or Washington Convention), poaching is one of the main causes for the decline of this species.

The project takes place in the Comoros Archipelagos on the Mozambique Chanel (Indian Ocean), and more precisely in the north of Grande Comoro island. near the village of N'Droudé and on the so called "turtle island". Formerly a major nesting site, the green turtles that come to N'Droudé to lay their eggs have little chance of returning to the sea alive; they are often poached before they even have time to bury their eggs in the sand. To aid in mitigating this worrying situation as quickly as possible, the Swiss Cetacean Society-SCS and its partner, the Comorian association Ulanga N'gazidja, are taking concrete actions for the conservation of green turtles.
